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THE UROLOGY GROUP'S DR. PAURUSH BABBAR RECOGNIZED AS CENTER OF EXCELLENCE FOR ARTIFICIAL URINARY SPHINCTER SURGERY

Cincinnati urologist becomes first physician in Ohio recognized as a Center of Excellence for both the AMS 800 Artificial Urinary Sphincter and AMS 700 Inflatable Penile Prosthesis

CINCINNATI (September 28, 2026) — The Urology Group announced today that Dr. Paurush Babbar has been recognized by Boston Scientific as a Center of Excellence for the AMS 800™ Artificial Urinary Sphincter, a leading surgical treatment for men with stress urinary incontinence.

The designation makes Dr. Babbar the first urologist in Ohio to earn Center of Excellence status for both the AMS 800 AUS and the AMS 700™ Inflatable Penile Prosthesis, reflecting his experience across the full spectrum of male prosthetic urologic surgery.

In 2026, Dr. Babbar performed more than 190 prosthetic urology procedures — the highest volume in Ohio. His practice focuses on male prosthetic and reconstructive urology, including surgical treatment of erectile dysfunction and urinary incontinence.

"Dr. Babbar's continued leadership in men's health reflects the type of highly specialized care we want to provide to patients throughout our region," said Dr. Stephen Kappa, president of The Urology Group. "Being the first physician in Ohio recognized as a Center of Excellence for both conditions is a significant distinction and reflects his commitment to surgical excellence, education and improving quality of life for men."

Dr. Babbar also serves on Boston Scientific's 14-member national Strategic Advisory Board and trains urology residents and fellows nationally in prosthetic surgery and men's health.

His work in urinary incontinence has extended to national patient education as well. Dr. Babbar was featured in Boston Scientific's [*DRY: The Journey to Treat Male Incontinence*](#), a six-episode documentary series created to reduce the stigma surrounding male bladder leakage. In the series, Dr. Babbar and his patient, Roberto, discuss the physical and emotional toll of urinary incontinence and Roberto's journey toward regaining urinary control and returning to the activities he enjoys.

"Urinary incontinence after prostate cancer treatment is much more than a medical inconvenience," Dr. Babbar said. "It can affect the way a man works, exercises, travels, interacts socially and maintains intimacy. Unfortunately, many men continue to live with significant leakage for years because they are embarrassed to discuss it or don't know effective treatments exist."

That focus on quality of life led Dr. Babbar to establish The Urology Group's Prostate Cancer Survivorship Clinic, the first program of its kind in Cincinnati, guiding patients from diagnosis through long-term recovery of urinary and sexual function.

"Treating cancer is obviously the priority, but our responsibility to the patient does not end when the cancer is controlled," Dr. Babbar said. "We want men not only to survive prostate cancer, but to regain their confidence, continence, sexual health and overall quality of life."



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The AMS 800 uses an inflatable cuff around the urethra, controlled by a small pump in the scrotum to help men regain urinary control after prostate procedures. When the patient needs to urinate, he activates the pump, temporarily opening the cuff and allowing the bladder to empty.

Dr. Babbar's dual Center of Excellence recognition underscores his role in advancing men's health care across Greater Cincinnati and the surrounding region.
